Fentanyl is often passed off as the new form of OxyContin, and sold on the street as: green beans, beans, green apples, apples, shady eighties, eighties, greenies or fake oxy.

About 100 times more toxic than morphine, heroin, or oxycodone: fentanyl is killing Albertans.

Deaths:

In 2014 alone, there were more than 100 deaths in Alberta, associated with fentanyl. From January 1, 2015 to September 30, 2015, there had been 213 Albertan deaths associated with fentanyl.

NOTE: next fentanyl death data update is anticipated in early spring 2016.

Emergency Department & Urgent Care Visits, Alberta:

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 1,443 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in Alberta, due to “poisoning by other opioid”

NOTE: This data category includes, but is not limited to, fentanyl.

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 306 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in Alberta, due to “poisoning by heroin”

NOTE: AHS ECC is now monitoring this code, as it is also used in situations of fentanyl overdose. Naloxone interventions should have the potential to also impact these numbers.

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 471 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in Alberta, due to “poisoning by synthetic narcotic”.

Deaths:

From January 1, 2015 to September 30, 2015, there were 213 Albertan deaths associated with fentanyl.

Of these 213 deaths, nine (9) were in the South Zone.

NOTE: next fentanyl death data update is anticipated in early spring 2016.

Emergency Department & Urgent Care Visits, South Zone:

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 193 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits due in the South Zone, to “poisoning by other opioid”

NOTE: This data category includes, but is not limited to, fentanyl.

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been three (3) Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in the South Zone, due to “poisoning by heroin”

NOTE: AHS ECC is now monitoring this code, as it is also used in situations of fentanyl overdose. Naloxone interventions should have the potential to also impact these numbers.

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 54 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in the South Zone, due to “poisoning by synthetic narcotic”.

Emergency Department & Urgent Care Visits, Central Zone:

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 152 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits due in the Central Zone, to “poisoning by other opioid”

Emergency Department & Urgent Care Visits, Edmonton Zone:

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 432 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits due in the Edmonton Zone, to “poisoning by other opioid”

From January 1, 2015 to November 30, 2015 there had been 107 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in the Edmonton Zone, due to “poisoning by heroin”

Emergency Department & Urgent Care Visits, North Zone:

From January 1, 2015 to October 31, 2015 there had been 164 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits due in the North Zone, to “poisoning by other opioid”

NOTE: This data category includes, but is not limited to, fentanyl.

From January 1, 2015 to October 31, 2015 there had been 24 Emergency Department and Urgent Care visits in the North Zone, due to “poisoning by heroin”
